Nature Guide / "Safari Ranger"


The term "nature guide"/ "field guide" is often confused with ranger (game ranger) and "tourist guide".

A game ranger manages a specific area where wild animals roam. The tourist guide profession embraces a vast complexity of specific areas of the entire country, guiding tourists in cities, museums, battlefields and many places of interest, placing the accent essentially on the manmade environment and cultural-historical aspects.

The Nature / Safari Guide leads people into the natural areas of the environment.

This form of guiding is not necessarily confined to walking trails. It can also include vehicle drives, horse-back safari's, canoeing and other outdoor activities.

The nature guide's interest relate to Ecology and Nature, but the name Ranger is so embedded in the Tourism Guiding Industry that it will never change... so by achieving this Qualification and Register as a Nature Guide you will be employed as a "Ranger" as a Game Reserve... Entertaining tourist to see leopard, lion, elephant, buffalo, rhino and so many other fascinating creatures.



Dangerous Game Guide / Trails Guide

(View Potentially Dangerous Animals)

Entrance Requirements: Nature Guiding + Tracking + Survival & Bushcraft



For the man in the bush, more important than having a sound knowledge of firearms, is having an intimate knowledge of the behaviour of dangerous game species. It is better to avoid a dangerous situation than have to face the consequences of a confrontation. To View Potentially Dangerous Animals on foot, a hands-on practical course, where Africa's dangerous game are tracked down and approach is done live and not via distance learning or class-room.....

Learn the golden rules, animal behaviour, anatomy and danger signs / displays and how to let your clients have an unforgettable safe experience.

The relationship between shooter, rifle and environment are constantly being challenged, but kept in check through speed and accuracy. Shooting scenarios have a limited amount of time to respond, so speed is often the primary goal. The mistake that happens is when we are compelled to act quickly, we emphasize speed over accuracy and actually end up missing the goal of the task entirely. You have to resist the urge to go so fast that you compromise your accuracy, this is probably the hardest skill to develop with a heavy calibre "Expect Anything – Assume Nothing - Fast is Fine but Accuracy is Everything".

Advance Rifle Handling **ARH** on Heavy Calibre Rifles (.458, 416). Learn how to use your big bore rifle fast and accurate, under pressure, at short distances with the correct shot placement to "drop" charging dangerous game.

Achieve the National Competency Certificate on Act 60 of 2000 on Use of a Rifle for Business Purposes Plus a Specialised Medical Course "STOP THE BLEEDING".

Tracking

Man has, over time, developed skills to survive in his natural environment. We know that man had to develop skills in the art of tracking to become a more effective hunter.

The refinement of tracking in Eco Tourism ensured the development in better techniques to locate elusive game

such as lion, leopard and special sought-after species.

The art of tracking has developed into a science with many practical uses and plays a major role in Nature Conservation, Eco-tourism, Environmental Education, Scientific Research, the control of and the fight against poaching, nature research programs and trophy location.



One needs practical experience to master the art of tracking. The art of tracking also includes the continuous, process of discovery and the most experienced tracker will always find something to learn.

Your tracking ability can only enhance the enjoyment of nature.

Game Rangers and Field Rangers are the principal guardians of the world's premier natural and cultural protected environments. Field Rangers are involved in complex and highly important tasks in the preservation of natural and cultural resources, which constitute core elements of the world's natural and cultural heritages. The Park Ranger - Game Ranger (Area Integrity Management) in the 3rd Year, complete this portfolio, in theory, practical and Workplace to lead Ranger Teams and successfully manage the integrity of Wildlife in Protected Areas, Game Farms, Nature Reserves, Provincial and National Parks in Africa.

Guiding Qualification Breakdown

The National Certificate in Guiding is the Only Qualification by law - Tourism Act 3 of 2014 to register as a Tourist Guide with the Department of Tourism. Please confirm this with your local Provincial -Registrar of Tourist Guides.

Qualifications for tourist guides are governed by the National Qualifications Framework (NQF).

There are currently two qualifications registered on the NQF:

National Certificate in Tourism: Guiding (NQF2) National Certificate in Tourism: Guiding (NQF4)

Note that a new NQF 4 qualification has recently been registered and this replaces the 20155 qualifications.

Several unit standards, within the different areas of specialisation, have been clustered together to form skills programmes addressing areas of specialisation, and aimed at persons wishing only to complete the specialised minimum area of learning required to guide.

These skills programmes are registered by CATHSSETA (The Culture Arts, Tourism, Hospitality and Sports Sector Education and Training Authority)for certification purposes. The applicable unit standards are registered on the NQF. In order to register as a site guide specialising in culture, nature, or adventure guiding you need different combinations of unit standards. These rules of combination can be accessed on the CATHSSETA website, at www.cathsseta.org.za.



Categories of Tour Guides

There are three categories of tourist guides:

- Site Guides these tourist guides have attained the minimum qualification in order to guide in a "limited geographical area" i.e. Hiking in the Drakensberg, visiting the Natal Battlefields, taking a day tour of Cape Town, visiting Soweto:
- Provincial Guides are qualified to take tourists around an entire province i.e. Limpopo or Gauteng;
- National Guides are permitted to conduct tours around South Africa, crossing all provincial boundaries.

These guides would accompany people taking a comprehensive tour of South Africa, say, by coach.

Classification of Tour Guides

Adventure Guides – conduct a guided adventure experience e.g. rock climbing, paddling, abseiling, etc.

Nature Guides – conduct a guided nature experience in areas such as Game Reserves, National Parks, nature conservation areas, trails, and the like.

Cultural Guides – conduct a guided cultural experience in a limited geographical area such as a museum, community, wine farm, town or city.

To register as a provincial or national guide you need, as a minimum, qualification at NQF level 2 plus the required unit standard for your area of specialisation – You can also view these on the CATHSSETA website as given above. Note that the requirements for guide registration, including what learning programme or course is needed for which category of guiding, is the competence of the Provincial Registrars of Tourist Guides.

Tourist Guiding Training & Assessors

All tourist guide trainers and assessors have to be accredited by CATHSSETA to be able to train according to the nationally recognized standards and qualifications network. The assessor must also have a valid ETDPSeta Qualification.

What is a Tour Guide?

Any person who, for monetary or other rewards, accompanies people who are travelling through or visiting any place within a country, and who furnishes those people with information or comments concerning a place or objects visited is defined as Tourist Guide. Many tourist guides may also wish to run their own tour operations in which they are both tour guide and tour operator.
